


An Act of Kindness: Flowers for Sarajevo: July 24, 2018

Participants enjoyed a live performance by local cellist Julie Carew, followed by a reading of the book. The performance and book were inspired by the Cellist of Sarajevo. Julie performed the same piece the cellist, Vedran Smailović, played called Albinoni's Adagio. Vedran played among the rubble

of a bakery that had been bombed, in an effort to stay hopeful in the midst of the siege of Sarajevo during the Bosnian War. After Julie's performance children and adults alike made paper flower bracelets to share with others in an act of kindness, mirroring the way in which the boy in the book shared his flowers.

Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes



Young people made paper cranes in the weeks leading up to the event. The project culminated at the Tuesday, August 7th event, in remembrance of

Hiroshima and Nagasaki, with a reading of an excerpt of *Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes* and *Peaceful Pieces: Poems and Quilts about Peace*. Origami expert, Mike Naughton, instructed participants in how to make paper cranes and other designs as well. The origami cranes were attached to a quilt, made by library staff member and quilter, Kathleen Lacey and displayed at the Carnegie Library for months after the event.
